

The Healing Power of Music: A Much anticipated lunch meeting of Lela Ala (97) and Roger Heer (74).

Roger, who often plays the piano after eating lunch with his friends, responded when the name, Lela Ala, came up. "She let me play the pipe organ here and we knew each other the whole time she led the music here at this church for ten years. She was so kind to me. She is my friend! I

would really like to see her again!" he said. "Music saved my life when polio hit me at age five. My parents set up a table with a record player and the 33 1/3, 45s and 78s, records I could play by myself and listen over and over again. My legs didn't work then, but I learned to read music and later to play the piano.

"The doctors gave me ten days to live when they first diagnosed anemia. So they used a dose of vitamin B 12, the very first time to use it. Then the polio diagnosis came. By help of the Lord, I lived. He did a Miracle and I lived a lot longer than any ten days!"

Roger offers the Shepherd's Hand Lunch mealtime prayer of thanksgiving often, so movingly sincere. "So you say Roger wants to see me again? Yes, I will go to lunch, but I don't play the piano anymore!" Lela Ala said.

After going by public transit and making her way down to lunch in her motorized chair, she exclaimed: "I haven't been here in this MUMC basement in years! It is wonderful to feed the hungry people and I am hungry too!" After lunch, she took herself over to the piano where Roger was seated on the bench playing a familiar tune. She managed to maneuver her wheelchair sideways; Roger scooted the bench away, she played with her right hand and soon they were playing three- handed familiar songs that a small group of friends began to sing along with.

On the ride back to Valley Manor, Lela remarked how wonderful it was to have her Barbershop Singers there with her!

Lela sat in the Valley Manor lobby and became reflective and recalled more about her music and the early polio.
"Mama, I can't raise my arm!" she had said. I was ten years old. My parents made seven trips to Denver Children's Hospital, six trips on the train from Redvale, one trip in a car. My dad, Charles Ross, who was a Scottish tenor, sang to me on every trip. I learned my songs by ear that way, and have always been

able to remember the tunes and lyrics and find the keys. I even became a piano teacher. The music saved me many times."

The doctors at first said "There is no cure for infantile paralysis." "Mama, my teacher, Mr. Hopper, and those boys make fun of my arm hanging like a rag! I don't want to go to school!"

"Mother got her piano when she was married in 1914.. In one of the first photos of me, I am a baby sitting on the piano bench. That bench is where I wanted to be all the time. But now, I can tell you, it is not easy to play the melody with my right hand while sitting up to the keyboard sideways!" I just move my electric wheelchair around until I can reach some keys."

"One doctor did do surgery on my deltoid muscle on my left side when I went for my sixth visit to Denver. My seventh visit was considered a first success with polio surgery. I could crawl my left hand across the piano keys, I could raise my arm! I spent hours on that piano bench, dreaming of playing with two hands all the songs my parents played for me on our Victrola. I memorized the tunes, some lyrics, and soon had both hands moving and my heart and mind so lifted!"

I assured Lela she could go to lunch at MUMC whenever she would like to. She was appreciative and said "This was a special time today and I will have the memory, but won't be going again."

Roger is writing his own songs now with The Joyful Sound music director at All Saints Church. His latest song is:" America, America Honor the Glory, Red, White and Blue, we stand on Freedom, we stand on Love, and honor Glory to the Red, White and Blue."

Raising awareness of the historical changes in medical treatment of polio can happen behind the scenes right here at MUMC. I visited with a new acquaintance, Cynthia Reiss, at the Mary Olive Circle Meeting. She shared a personal experience with polio while being a nursing student at Chicago Wesley Memorial Hospital in 1964. She was responsible for the care of a patient in an iron lung, dealing with the emotional impact on both the young woman patient and herself. So from the era of Little Lela Ross at age ten in 1923 through the sixties, the dread of infantile paralysis existed for families across the world.

Now, we can be thankful for the Salk vaccine that has basically eradicated polio world-wide and can appreciate our history of scientific research that has relieved us from epidemics of scarlet fever, diphtheria, influenza, typhoid fever and measles that many of us know devastated members of our own families many years ago.

We can appreciate the Polio Awareness fundraising which will take place in Ridgway in 2020 at the Ouray County Ranch Museum. We will raise funds to pay for the refurbishing

and transport of an iron lung to be displayed there.

That iron lung was used to save the life of Vera Junek at age 17. She is the mother of Joan Chismire, Director of the museum. So we have work to do to raise awareness of our progress, and now we can pray for the discovery of an Ebola vaccine.



Online Giving

Advent

Online giving to the church is available through our web site, www.montroseumc.org, and by texting to (970) 475-8575.

Using our web site, select "GET IN TOUCH" and then "GIVING." This will take you to a page with a form to fill out. Enter how much you would like to give and then choose either "Credit Card or ACH Transfer from your back account. By default the money you give will go into the General Fund through the account "41001 Envelopes and Tithes." You have the option to choose another account with a drop-down menu. You have the option to choose "one time gift" or, with a drop-down menu, a recurring gifts of "weekly," "every 2 weeks," "monthly," or" yearly." You will be sent a receipt by email.

When you text to (970) 475-8575 the first time you will be prompted to enter your payment detail, either a credit card or bank account from which to give. Breeze, our church wide computer management program, will remember your payment information, so the next time you want to give simply enter the amount and send. The default is to give to the General Fund. If you want to give to another fund, enter the amount followed by one of the following keywords:
